The third book in this series (The Dust Will Never Settle) is slated for release in Junuary 2010 and the last (Tanzim) should be out in January 2011. Each of these deals with other aspects of terrorism that could not be tackled in earlier books due to paucity of space and the vastness of the subject. They also carry ahead Iqbal. Col Anbu and Force 22—all three of whom are very real, lovable characters. It has been my endeavour to use my personal experience in counter-terrorism and try and act as an early warning... in addition to providing the adrenaline rush that every action thriller must do...no?

Why leart and my publisher Collins guided me here (smiles). I love Rajasthan and have spent some wonderful years of my life here. You will also see a lot of different things that will happen during this series, because Karthika VK at Harper and I are very clear that—since the books are different from what any other Indian writer has attempted so far and so topical—we shall be doing many things differently, including going to those smaller cities that others shy away from.
