India's only military-thriller author and ex-army major, **MUKUL DEVA**, talks about his latest book — *Salim Must Die*

ROARING guns and bullets whizzing past you a soldier's nightmare and also probably one of the most adrenalin-rushing moments in life — all come alive through the pages of Salim Must Die, a book that promises to be a realistic portrayal of the subcontinent and the Middle East burning in the fire of dictatorship and unrest. The author, ex-army major, 48-yearold, Mukul Deva, India's only military-thriller writer is back with the sequel to his first book Lahkar, that went on to become a bestseller in the Indian sub-continent.

Deva says, "While there are a lot of sensitive issues like weapon systems, setting up bombs and military strikes, it becomes necessary to take some poetic freedom to distort certain facts. You cannot take a chance with who lays hands on my books."
